Planning Process Review

Background:

- On May 25, 2021, Alameda County Board of Supervisors (BOS) unanimously approved a "Care First, Jails Last" Policy Resolution.
- The Care First, Jails Last policy affirmed that Alameda County values a comprehensive continuum of care for individuals with mental illness, substance use, and cooccurring disorders rather than incarceration.
- The Care First, Jails Last policy also called for a just and equitable transformation of criminal justice, behavioral health, and wraparound services that reduces the number of people with mental illness, substance use, and co-occurring disorders in Santa Rita Jail.



Care First, Jails Last Taskforce

Overview

- The "Care First, Jails Last Task Force" shall be a twenty-five (25) member body charged with developing a countywide implementation plan, subject to approval by the Board of Supervisors, informed by what was proposed by the Justice Involved Mental Health Task Force for the next two years.
- The Alameda County Mental Health Advisory Board will take over the monitoring of the countywide plan, thereafter. This two-year process will be financed by each of the seven participating County departments. (BOS Budget Hearing, June 24, 2021)
- Brown Act covered body.



Care First, Jails Last Taskforce

BOS Approved 25-Member Taskforce

- Five (5) Community Representatives: Each Supervisor will appoint a representative from their District. The preference is that it will include people with lived experience, or family of people with lived experience, either criminal justice involved or mental health experiences.
- Nine (9) Alameda County Officials: The Agency/Office Director (or designee) will serve on the committee.
 - Alameda County Behavioral Health (Committee Chair)
 - Alameda County District Attorney's Office
 - Alameda County Housing and Community Development Department
 - Alameda County Sheriff's Office
 - Alameda County Social Services Agency
 - Alameda County Office of Homeless Care and Coordination
 - Alameda County Public Defender
 - Alameda County Probation Department
 - Alameda County Superior Court (Presiding Judge or designee)

*The following representatives will be appointed by the Board of Supervisors Health Committee:

- Three (3) Community Based Service Providers (must provide services to formerly incarcerated individuals, mental health care services, and/or substance use treatment services), one from each of the following regions:
 - North County
 - South County
 - Tri-Valley
- **Two (2) City Program Directors:** (should be from cities that are the two most impacted cities, and Program Directors must provide services that aim to divert people with mental illness, substance use or co-occurring disorders from jail).
- Two (2) Representatives from any of the following:
 - Alameda County Mental Health Advisory Board
 - Alameda County Mental Health Collaborative
 - Alameda Health System
 - East Bay Supportive Housing Collaborative
- Four (4) Representatives from Police Agencies selected one from each of the following regions of Alameda County:
 - Central Region
 - North County
 - South County
 - Tri-Valley
